1. Could you please share a bit about your background, including your education and early life?

Coming from a humble village background, our family moved to Sahiwal, where I completed my secondary education at Madrasa Bintul Islam in 1962. I pursued my higher secondary and bachelor's education at Government College Sahiwal, followed by a degree in Education from Lady MacLagan College, Lahore, in 1967.

2. What was your role during the founding phase of the American Lyceum International School?

I am the Co-Founder of ALIS. Together with my husband, Engr. C.M. Nadeem Qadri, whose passion for education was unwavering, we established the school in 1984 with just two students.

Students must be hardworking, punctual, and respectful to their parents and teachers. They should maintain good health and nutrition. I believe: When health is lost, something is lost. When wealth is lost, nothing is lost. But when character is lost, everything is lost. Therefore, character building should be a top priority.

6. Education has evolved over the years. What is one element you believe should remain constant in schools?

Discipline is fundamental and must always remain a cornerstone of the educational system.

7. What has been your proudest moment in your journey with American Lyceum?

My proudest moments are when I see my former students excelling in life becoming doctors, engineers, and professionals in various fields leading happy and successful lives.

8. What message would you like to give to parents, teachers, and students who are part of the American Lyceum family?

They should remain loyal to their work, their families, their institution, their country, and most importantly, to themselves.






Student Spotlights: Izmir Town and JTB

1. Please tell us about your teaching background and experience in Oman?

I moved to Oman in 2022, shortly after the pandemic, and began teaching Grades 1 to 3 at the American Lyceum School. Later, I transitioned to the American Lyceum Nursery to explore early childhood education, and since then, I've been working with children aged 3 to 4. Prior to moving to Oman, I had over 13 years of experience teaching English as a second language to various age groups, mostly adults and university graduates.

2. What inspired you to become a teacher, and how has that inspiration evolved over time?

My passion for teaching started with a love for the English language and a genuine desire to help others communicate clearly and confidently. Early on, I was really inspired by the joy of watching students grow and succeed through learning. Over the years, that inspiration has turned into a strong commitment to making learning fun, engaging, and meaningful.

3. How do you adapt your teaching methods to suit students from diverse cultural and linguistic backgrounds?

Having worked with students from all sorts of cultural and language backgrounds, I really focus on creating a classroom that's welcoming and respectful for everyone. I like to mix up my teaching methods—using visuals, hands-on activities, and real-life examples that



connect with different cultures. I also try to keep communication open and take time to understand each student's background and how they learn best. This helps me build a good connection with them and boosts their confidence and language skills.

4. What has been the most rewarding part of teaching in Muscat?

One of the best parts of teaching in Muscat has been getting to know students from so many different cultural backgrounds. It's really rewarding to see them grow—not just in their studies, but also in their confidence and how they express themselves. The kindness and respect from both students and parents make the whole experience feel really special. Plus, being part of a supportive school community that truly values learning and growth has been a big highlight of my time here.

5. How do you handle challenges in the classroom, especially when it comes to behavior management or student engagement?

I really believe that to handle any challenge, you've got to get to the root of it first. When it comes to managing behavior, I focus on setting clear expectations from the start and keeping the classroom positive and respectful. I've found that being consistent, patient, and open goes a long way. To keep students engaged, I try to make lessons fun, interactive, and connected to things they actually care about. Building strong relationships with them is a big part of it too—it helps them feel seen, supported, and more willing to get involved.

6. In what ways do you use technology to enhance learning and student interaction?

I integrate educational videos into my lessons to make learning more fun and engaging.

7. Describe a lesson or project you've done that had a meaningful impact on your students?

Every Thursday, we do different activities, and it's amazing to see how much fun and educational activities can help kids learn. For example, a couple of weeks ago, we had a Career Day as part of a lesson about future careers. The kids came to the nursery dressed in costumes related to jobs they might want in the future and acted out those roles. I couldn't believe how excited and engaged they were—it was such a fun experience!

8. How do you encourage creativity and critical thinking among your students?

I encourage creativity and critical thinking by making learning fun and giving kids lots of chances to explore. For example, we play games where they can imagine different things, like pretending to be animals or building with blocks.

I

also ask them simple questions like, "What do you think will happen if we try this?" or "Can you show me a new way to do this?" This helps them think about ideas and try new things while having fun!

9. What have you learned about yourself as an educator through your experience in Muscat?at has been the most rewarding part of teaching in Muscat?

Teaching in Muscat has really shown me how important it is to be flexible and aware of different cultures in the classroom. I've realized that being a good teacher isn't just about giving lessons—it's about connecting with students, understanding what they need, and growing with them. This experience has helped me become more patient, more empathetic, and has reminded me how powerful a supportive, inclusive classroom can be. It's definitely reinforced my love for teaching.


